Contacts

An **Institution Liaison** is the member's key contact for inquiries from faculty and staff at other member and prospective member institutions as well as for WICHE staff. The **Student Contact** provides prospective students (first-time enrollees and transfer students) with an advisor, transfer articulation expert, or other familiar with how Interstate Passport works at your institution. *Please keep the two contacts that appear in the public view of your profile up to date at all times*.

Information on Your Website

As a member of the Interstate Passport Network (IPN), your institution agrees to promote its membership on its website. Your profile links to this specific page. Be sure to include the following:

- General information about what the Passport is and how it works, including how to earn it at your institution and how to transfer in and out with it. See recommended language on the next page.
- A copy of your "Official Passport Block". Students who want to earn a Passport at your institution will refer to this. Some institutions put the Block directly on their web page; others link to a PDF copy that can be easily printed. Please keep your official Block updated at all times.
- Contact information for the academic advising team or advisor familiar with how to both earn and use a Passport to transfer in and out.



Recommended Language for Campus Websites

Each member of the Interstate Passport Network(IPN) agrees to post information on their website that explains what the program is, how their students can earn and use a Passport, and displays the official Interstate Passport Network member logo. Thus, this language serves as a guide to the information students need and can be used as is or modified as appropriate for the members' sites.

Please put this information in a location on your site that can be easily found, linking from other areas as appropriate (general education requirements page, admissions, transfer student page, catalog, etc.) Also ensure that the address to this page is the one displayed on your IPN profile so students and parents browsing there can get to more information on your site easily.

Earn or use a Passport to help streamline your pathway to a degree!

What is a Passport? A Passport awarded by [insert name of institution] signifies that you have not only completed your lower-division general education requirements here, but will be recognized as having completed the lower-division general education requirements of every other school participating in the Interstate Passport Network.

The Passport is accepted by other Network schools because it means you have achieved the general education learning outcomes that all Network schools agree are important as a foundation for upper-division coursework, career, and civic life, even though the courses and credits may be different. It is also a milestone of completion representing approximately 25-30% of a bachelor's degree.

How can I earn a Passport here? Our school has created a menu of course options (link to your Passport Block on your site) that meet our own lower-division general education requirements and, at the same time, cover the areas that all of the Interstate Passport Network (link to http://interstatepassport.wiche. edu/transfer/) schools have agreed are important in general education. Why should I earn a Passport? With a Passport, you will have a strong academic foundation upon which to build as you advance in your studies. Many of the skills and knowledge you acquire in earning the Passport are those sought after by employers, so documentation of that achievement may also be helpful in early work force positions.

How can a Passport help transfer students? If you have a Passport, your lower-division general education requirements will be met at all schools that are members of the Interstate Passport Network (link to http://interstatepassport.wiche.edu/transfer/). Each school displays the Network's official logo on their website to let students know that their Passports will be valued there.

The Interstate Passport at Utah State University

To receive an Interstate Passport at Utah State University students must complete the USU General Education requirements. An integrated program, USU's General Education expectations benchmark to the Course Designation Criteria at USU, and to the Utah State University Degree Profile

They also reflect the expectations for all general education students in Utah as defined in the Utah System of Higher Education's Policy R 470 that defines General Education Competencies, Fluencies and Proficiencies for all the essential learning outcomes of General Education.

Because they interlock, many of the Interstate Passport areas are taught and reinforced in multiple courses.

PASSPORT BLOCK OVERVIEW

Dixie State University's General Education Mission Reflects the values, mission, and learning outcomes forwarded by the Interstate Passport project:

Dixie State University General Education Mission

The General Education program at Dixie State University develops citizen-scholars as it:

- · Fosters the development of knowledge across a broad range of liberal arts and sciences disciplines.
- Provides students with the intellectual tools required to think critically and communicate effectively.
- Equips students with the information literacy and quantitative reasoning skills that facilitate success in college and in life.
- Challenges students to explore and appreciate diversity in a globalized world.
- Encourages students to evaluate the responsibilities of citizenship.
- · Prepares students for life-long learning.

PASSPORT BLOCK OVERVIEW

The Interstate Passport enables successful transfer of a block of lower-level general education learning to other institutions participating in the Interstate Passport Network. Students who complete their Passport at Laramie County Community College will not be required to repeat or take additional course work to meet lower division general education requirements in the Passport's nine areas when they transfer to any other Passport institution. Laramie County Community College began transcripting the Interstate Passport following the Fall 2016 semester.

Beginning in the summer of 2019, all courses that would continue as general education had to re-apply for general education status to ensure that each course was meeting the competencies and outcomes through the passport. Faculty had to describe how their course competencies aligned with the general education competencies oulined in our new procedure and what learning activities would support that learning.

Additionally, in the fall of 2018, we also adopted a general education philosophy that would ensure that all approved general education courses would allow students to devlop the 4 essential practices that all employers and transfer institutions are looking for:

- 1. Practices of Exploration, Research, and Problem Solving
- 2. Practices of Creativity and Innovation
- 3. Practices of Empathy and Integrity
- 4. Practices of Communication and Collaboration

All newly approved general education courses must demonstrate how students are practicing the above skills. Attached are examples of documents that faculty used to document this work, but we have since integrated these processes to our curriculum management system.



Nine knowledge and skill areas make up your institution's Passport Block. Please be sure to SAVE the information you add in each area before moving to the next one. *Please return regularly to edit your profile as lower-division general education courses change on your campus.*

- List the requirements in each area, writing clear instructions for students in the top row with courses and learning opportunities by which students can achieve the learning outcomes in this area underneath in a table format.
- If some course options appear in multiple areas, be sure to clarify instuctions for students. Can a course be double counted? Can a student take another course in the same discipline or must it be in a different discipline?
- In some areas, such as Natural Science, you can use sub-headings to separate different categories of courses.
- List all the course options, not just a few examples that require the student to go to your website for the information.
- To upload an entire list of courses at once, you can use the course import wizard by selecting the Excel icon near the bottom right side of the list. Then, upload a CSV file using the formatting requirements requested on that page.
- In relevant areas, add a sub-category "Learning Opportunities" to list other options such as test scores by which courses can be waived or extra-curricular activities in which the learning outcomes can be achieved.


